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The terms "normativity" and "norm" will be used several times in this document, not to validate dominant social norms, but rather to denounce them. The use of these words aims to highlight inequalities, not to endorse them. The use of these terms critiques this reality and sheds light on its impact on our society and, more particularly, on the LGBTQIA+ community.

The term "marginalized" will also be employed to denounce the dynamics of exclusion that exist. Although I do not adhere to this terminology, it allows us to stress that intersectional individuals, who accumulate various forms of oppression, are more vulnerable to discrimination. The use of this expression aims to showcase inequalities, including within the LGBTQIA+ community itself, which particularly affects those living at the intersection of different kinds of oppression.

INTRODUCTION

The Various Voices Festival, founded in 1985, has embodied for nearly four decades the strength of LGBTQIA+ choirs. This international festival is much more than just a musical gathering. It is a place for sharing, solidarity, and celebrating diversity. Throughout its history, Various Voices has accompanied the struggles and victories of the queer community, while offering a platform for artistic expression to thousands of choral singers across Europe and beyond.

Music, with its capacity to transcend boundaries, is a universal language that has always united us. As a means of expression, resistance, and celebration, singing brings individuals together in harmony where differences fade away to give way to collective emotion. Its absolute opposite, silence, essential to the score, is equally present in our lives, particularly in the lives of those who step outside normativity. Imposed muteness, where we are asked not to make waves, where we must go back into our closets or shells, where our voices might not be heard. However, this silence is broken when music rises and voices unite to shatter these invisible chains.

The Various Voices Festival, which has traversed Europe since 1985, will echo resoundingly in the streets of the EU capital, Brussels, in 2026. More than just a musical gathering, this event marks a powerful moment where the European LGBTQIA+ choir community takes possession of public space to assert its presence and pride. Each performance and each song will be a message sent to all of Europe: our hearts beat, our voices rise, and our struggle for recognition continues. We will make our hearts heard.

Beyond the many nationalities, this festival highlights the diversity of our identities, the connections that unite us, and the energy of our group. The themes explored during these days will immerse us in our history, as well as in our future aspirations. Unifying generations and cultures, *Various Voices 2026* will be a space of sharing where plurality will be celebrated in all its splendour.

The festival is not just a cry of resistance; it is above all a symphony of joy and solidarity. Each song is a moment of openness to others, a celebration of living together where diversity is our greatest strength. Our voices, powerful and united, transcend barriers and tell stories of shared happiness, vibrant emotions, and a collective celebration that awakens the heart. Prepare to break the silence with your songs that will resonate under the stars.

For this festival, we want to journey through our history, but also through different universes. Each day will be assigned a theme that illustrates our community, Belgium, and *Various Voices*. To bring this to life, we invite you to participate in the creation of each show. All practical details can be found on page 11 of this document.

CABARET

Opening Ceremony

Wednesday, June 24, 2026

BOZAR – Henry Le Bœuf Hall

- «The cabaret is a space of resistance where serious topics can be treated in an entertaining way. »

The cabaret is a place of transgression where body, politics and art meet. Since its emergence in the 19th century, it has been an intimate refuge for marginalized artists, particularly those from the LGBTQIA+community. These secret gardens, often provocative and unrestrained, have become sanctuaries for those who do not conform to the norm.

As early as the 1920s, performances by queer artists in famous cabarets helped LGBTQIA+ individuals carve out a space within the artistic scene. These venues were not only places of entertainment where taboos were broken but also spaces of resistance, where conventions were challenged, and where gender and sexuality were played with freely.

The cabaret, with its dim lights and intimate atmosphere, has always represented a place where queers could express themselves without compromise. It is a space where the freedom to transgress codes is not only tolerated but celebrated. For the opening ceremony, this ambiance will be recreated with enchanting choreography and vibrant performances, reminding us that these venues are much more than artistic stages: they are our poetic refuge of fun.

For this ceremony, choirs are invited to participate with sensuality, flamboyant costumes, and subversive songs, immersing us in this unique universe within a setting that celebrates the freedom to be oneself. The cabaret is a space where social conventions are swept aside in favour of authentic and bold expression. Singing in such a setting is a way to break free and have total enjoyment, in complete complicity.

For one night, the cabaret becomes a space of rebirth, conviviality, and rebellion, where dreams, imagination, and non-conformity come together to celebrate with spontaneity; an explosion of colourful creativity.

THE TREACHERY OF IMAGES

surrealism

Thursday, June 25, 2026 Royal Circus of Brussels

- « La résistance est la condition de la création. »
- « Resistance is the condition of creation. »

Claude Cahun (1894 – 1954): French non-binary actor ess, photographer and visual artist.

Surrealism, which emerged in the early 20th century, is an artistic movement that celebrates the irrational and the liberation from conventions. Well-established in Belgium with figures such as René Magritte, Jane Graverol, and Rachel Baes, it advocates the subversion of rules and the exploration of the unconscious. Similarly, the queer movement reinvents social codes, rejecting dominant norms and imposed expectations. It is a way to free oneself from the invisible dimensions often stigmatized by society.

Freaks, once exhibited (Barnum & Bailey Circus, world expositions in London 1851 and Chicago 1893, etc.), were reduced to their marginality and subjected to the voyeurism of the crowds. Considered as objects of fascination and repulsion, they embodied a form of ultimate otherness, dehumanized and dominated by a system that used them for entertainment purposes.

The queer community, itself stigmatized by insult, opened its arms to them, seeing in their exclusion a shared experience. Queer* and freak —these derogatory terms— have been linked by a history of rejection, as well as a common desire to rebuild themselves.

This cohesion has allowed not only for growth but also for strengthening, freeing itself from marginalization by creating a larger community made of diversity and resilience. From domination and exclusion, queer individuals and freaks reconstructed their identity, finding in this alienation a new source of power and pride. Like surrealism, born from the destruction of war, the queer movement transformed oppression into creativity, inventing other worlds and new forms of beauty.

This spirit of liberation and reconstruction will be celebrated through performances where the absurd and the imaginary intertwine. Choirs are invited to explore this surreal universe, to offer an experience where the collective unconscious expresses itself. An opportunity to let imagination and audacity invent dreamlike worlds where everything is possible. A breath that invites us to dream together and create unforgettable collective experiences.



Monarchs of Heart

Friday, June 26, 2026

MONT DES ARTS – Outdoor Stage

« We're all born naked and the rest is drag. »

RuPaul: Drag queen, singer, host and American producer.

For decades, the LGBTQIA+ community has created its own monarchy. These iconic faces, often from the drag world, embody resistance and queer pride. From the 1960s onward, artists such as Divine, a drag pioneer, Sylvester, a disco scene icon, Stormé DeLarverie, a King and central figure in the Stonewall riots, and Diane Torr, who explored drag as a form of political performance, personified this alternative royalty, openly defying norms of gender and sexuality. Through their exuberance, these personalities have shown that the title need not be monarchic, but exists in the reclamation of systems of domination and the freedom to be oneself.

The Ballrooms in the United States in the 1980s allowed marginalized performers to assert themselves in all their splendour. These events, born within racially diverse LGBTQIA+communities, provided a space where grandeur and dignity are celebrated. Sovereignty here is synonymous with pride and personal expression, transcending social barriers.

Royal figures in the queer community, far more than just artists, have played a fundamental role in our struggles for equality. They have been at the forefront of the struggle for LGBTQIA+ rights, proudly carrying the banner of freedom.

By revisiting these personalities through pride songs, choirs are invited for this outdoor evening to celebrate these imperial figures of the queer scene. Through grand performances, we hope they will pay homage to the iconic artists of our history: legendary drag performers or celebrities who have flamboyantly marked our story. This rainbow royalty, adorned with extraordinary costumes and symbolic crowns, embodies strength and resilience. A vibrant tribute to those who forged the greatness of our community while celebrating their chosen family, a cornerstone of queer monarchies.

Under the spotlight, queer royalty shines brightly, embodying the grandeur of a community that also knows how to laugh at itself and party with flair. Each crown is a tribute to the joy of living together, to flamboyant humour, and to the vibrant energy that flows through our celebrations. In this royalty, every moment is an invitation to joy and love.

We do not wish to reproduce these problematic dynamics but to pay tribute to this culture that is essential to queer royalty, especially in a context that values our diversity and struggles.

For decades, the LGBTQIA+ community has been fighting fiercely for equal rights in Europe. While some countries have made notable advances, others remain behind, failing to guarantee safety or recognition for queer individuals. Brussels, the capital of Europe, is a symbol in these ongoing struggles.

May 17, 1990, marked a historical turning point with the removal of homosexuality from the list of mental illnesses by the World Health Organization (January 2022 for trans identity). These events were decisive steps in the recognition of LGBTQIA+rights worldwide. However, our rights are never guaranteed, and the rise of conservative/extreme right movements in Europe reminds us how fragile these advances remain. History teaches us that battles for greater equality are the result of decades of struggle, while sometimes it only takes a snap of the fingers to make everything disappear.

This outdoor evening will celebrate the victories achieved, while remaining aware that the path to true equality is still long. The choirs gathered here will sing and witness for freedom, hope, and solidarity, proudly displaying the colors of their nations and of Europe. Each will represent its country, but also the history of our community, and especially a shared future.

Brussels, a multicultural city, is the ideal place for such an event. It is a ground of diversity and dialogue, as well as a venue where the politics that affect all of Europe are played out. This gathering will provide an opportunity for queer choirs to seize a public space, transforming it into a stage for visibility, resistance, and revolt. A stage will be built on Mont des Arts, an iconic location in the capital.

Under the stars of Europe and Brussels, our voices will unite to sing Let Your Heart Be Heard, the anthem specially composed by Simon Finn for Various Voices 2026 and this evening of June 27. This moment will be powerful and unforgettable, bringing together singers from all over Europe and beyond, singing in perfect harmony in a public space. Together, without exception, we will reverberate this unique anthem, forcefully remembering that our hearts beat for a more just future, where everyone can live without fear or discrimination. Let's unite our voices and sing together!

Saturday evening will represent European multiculturalism, with choirs invited to participate with their truths, their stories, and testimonies, plunging us into a political universe that will take us beyond borders. To help us on this journey, we encourage you to sing in your original language.
